April 2014—Transcendence

A Message from Our Minister

"The mortal limit of the Self was loosed, And passed into the Nameless, as a cloud

Melts into Heaven. I touch'd my limbs, the limbs

Were strange, not mine — and yet no shade of doubt,

But utter clearness, and thro' loss of Self

The gain of such large life as match'd with ours

Were Sun to spark — unshadowable in words,

Themselves but shadows of a shadow-world."

— excerpt from The Ancient Sage by Alfred Lord Tennyson

In this poem, Tennyson describes a moment of transcendence that most of us may long for, but never find, or maybe have experienced only once in our lives. I have read other descriptions of such experiences and have had brief moments that passed that felt transcendent to me. I have wondered if those moments were the moments described by poets and theologians alike -- a sort of mystical experience that passes quickly. Perhaps, you too have felt moments when your limbs melted into something.

For Tennyson it was the clouds. It is as if he was lifted up into the sky. I wonder if this could be what heaven truly is -- a transcendent experience in which one feels as if rising above the earth and merging with the sky realm? But Tennyson says it is "as a cloud melts into heaven." He is using the word as to demonstrate that sense of self that is no longer immanent, and thus does not claim that he is sure. And yet he then says that there is no doubt, and it is clear, as to what he may be experiencing. He claims that through the loss of self something larger than life is gained.

In various spiritual practices, this idea of loss of self is the goal. It is a becoming more sage-like and letting go of the material world that many seek when focusing on those practices such as meditation and prayer. Something that can be hard to do as we are surrounded by temptations of acquiring more and more and experiencing less and less. I know I struggle with focusing on more experiences rather than acquiring more material items in my world.

And I have longed for the ability to explain feelings of transcendence when in states of meditation and prayer, but also when I have experienced them unexpectedly out in the world. And I have experienced doubt about what may have occurred and so had a difficult time putting pen to paper when wanting to describe the experience. So I wonder how Tennyson can be so sure that he could commit those feelings to paper?

And I, too, have longed to lose my sense of self so that I gain that which is bigger than myself. I believe I have had such experiences in a state of meditation and prayer. And perhaps such a transcendent experience is truly the experience of the divine presence. But what about those experiences that may feel transcendent as when we are in meditation or prayer, but are clearly not at a moment of solitude and reflection, and may be at a moment of sorrow or suffering or when feeling a sense of chaos? Can transcendence be felt at those times, too?

This month let us dive into our 1st source that informs our Unitarian Universalist faith:

"Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life."

Perhaps in focusing on this source we can learn more about transcendence and find that which many of us may be in search of...


May our individual and collective spirits be renewed this month. May we all experience transcendence in our lives!
